One new feature, the 180 mile wide Rachmaninoff crater, is filled smooth with lava that cooled as recently as a billion years ago; scientists previously assumed that all volcanic activity had ceased shortly after the planet formed, 4.5 billion years ago. Messenger also measured fierce magnetic storms, as the planet is buffeted by particles streaming from the sun. Next spring, the spacecraft will again approach Mercury and make a series of orbits. "We're really looking forward to the orbit phase," says NASA space physicist James Slavin. "It might be a treasure trove."
